Eighty-nine young women and men were confirmed by Bishop Thomas J. Tobin, here at Christ the King on the morning of Saturday, May 7. This sacramental celebration was the culmination of a two-year journey in which the Confirmandi each participated in two retreats, completed 30 hours of stewardship projects, engaged in classroom and small group discussions on a variety of subjects, and of course participated in worship with the faith community.

Most of the class agreed that the biggest impact on their preparation was their stewardship time. Here they felt that they truly made a difference. Many taught in Vacation Bible school, or in the Religious Formation program. Others were stewards at parish events such as the harvest supper, Advent wreath workshop or the Souper Bowl supper.

All students completed their required hours, but some went far beyond what was required and worked in the

community as well. Bridget Skerry, Kathleen Rafanelli and Pat Corso worked a summer at Ocean State soccer camp. Danielle Millick was a junior counselor at the YMCA camp. Kendal Feaster did her hours at Woman and Infants Hospital, and Abby Greene coordinated meals for Welcome House.

Ashley Ginda was a peer math tutor at Coventry High School. Alex Perrault and Devyn and Brandon Hildebrandt worked in nursing homes. Many of these students doubled or tripled the hours that were required for Confirmation.

But whether the hours were 15 or 30 or 120, each student followed their heart and lived their faith. We are truly blessed to have them as members of our community.

Summertime and the livin' is easy – sometimes too easy



When I was growing up in Cranston, there was a little Protestant church that I would go by every day. It seems that I have enjoyed reading church signs since I was a little boy. I remember reading that this church was closed for July and August. I rode my bike home as quickly as I could, and asked my mother how a church could be closed for the summer.

The answer she gave me then would be terribly non-ecumenical today, but it did not seem odd back then. She said, without any malice, “They are a bit strange.”

Catholic churches, as we all know, don’t close for the summer. Unfortunately, however, there seem to be a growing number of Catholics who take the summer off. It is a behavior that I frankly do not understand. Why does it make sense to give up the Eucharist for the summer?

Some folks tell me they just don’t like to break up a nice sunny beach day by trying to fit church into their easy-living summertime mentality. Others say that when they travel it is not easy to find a Catholic church or to find out what the Mass schedule is. They say this with a straight face, even though they and I know that most Catholic churches post the Mass times on their sign-

boards. With today’s technology, it is very easy to find out when Masses are scheduled. All you have to do is go to www.Masstime.org, type in the city or town where you are staying, and *voila!* you have the Mass schedule.

Parents never admit that they take the summer off, but their young children do. I have children tell me, “Mom and Dad say we don’t have to go to church once religious education classes are finished.” Even if they did not tell me, all I have to do is look out on Sundays after those sessions are done for the year and see how our numbers noticeably go down. A very wise priest told me many years ago that religion is caught, not taught. What kind of example are parents giving if they show by their actions that finding the time to worship and thank God for all His gifts is an optional activity?

While I am at it, there is another behavior that I do not understand. Some folks go to other churches during the summer. I realize that sometimes this might be necessary. Sometimes our day is so full that the Mass schedule at another church might be more favorable. Having said that, I would like to ask everyone who is a member of our parish to make every possible effort to worship with us each and every week. Unless you are sick or away, we expect you here with us for Mass each and every weekend.

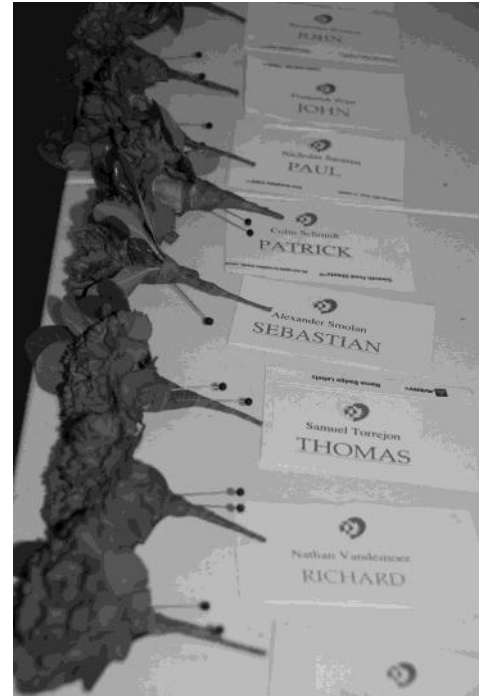

Season of Welcome, Season of Joy

This wonderful season of spring might also be called the season of Sacrament. When all of creation is springing forth from the dead of winter here in New England, we as believers emerge from the desert of Lent into the light of the resurrection!

We are an Easter people, celebrating the fullness of God's gifts to us, especially the gift of His Son, Jesus. What better time for welcome! We welcome the adults in our RCIA process at the Easter Vigil. We resume our Baptism schedule, welcoming infants and children at a Sunday liturgy each month. This year, 89 young men and women were sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit as they celebrated confirmation. What better time to celebrate Eucharist, the Real Presence of Jesus among us!

It is also time for welcoming our parish children to the Eucharistic table to receive First Holy Communion. While this is a special event for these children and their families, it is equally important for our parish community. Gathering for Sunday liturgy has always been important to believers, but Vatican II reminded us that weekly liturgy is the "source and summit," the nurturing core of the believing community. The recipient of our annual Stewardship Award on April 30 was **Mr. Joseph Laffey**. Joe was present at the dedication of Christ the King Parish in 1956, as an aide to then-Governor Roberts.

Joe Laffey is both a familiar face and name to many generations of families in South County. He taught history at South Kingstown High School for many years, and his long-time stewardship at our parish began in the Ministry of Lector and continued for quite some time.

Joe is involved in a monthly stewardship project – he is the first to sign his name on Stewardship Weekend as a driver to Assumption Parish. He loads his car with our food collection and unloads it again in Providence.

Early on a Sunday morning, he is a frequent visitor to Dunkin' Donuts as he packs up the CTK donut order in his car and then arrives at the parish kitchen to make lemonade for the children and prepare coffee for the adults. This is all accomplished beginning at about 6:45 a.m.

These time-consuming contributions are made even more poignant as Joe will be 89 years old this coming New Year's Eve!

Look at the photo carefully if you are new to South County. Perhaps you did not sit in his classroom, but this healthy gentleman cycles the roads of South County and the bike path 20 miles each day! He is the father of 10 children, grandfather of 18 and great-grandfather of 8.

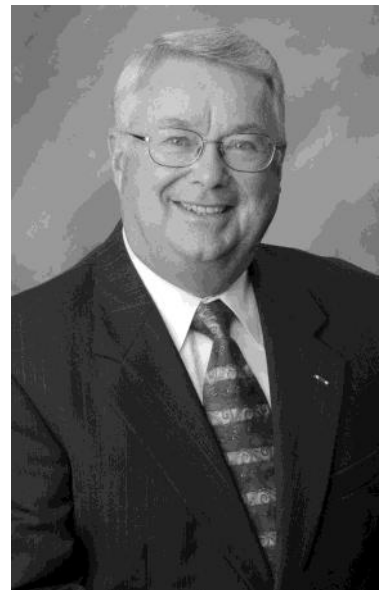

Recently, I was blessed with the opportunity to travel to Guatemala with fellow physical therapy students and volunteer in several rural villages. This was quite an eye-opening experience for me. Many of these families live in homes that are smaller than most master bathrooms, but still manage to count their blessings every day.

During our stay, we were privileged to work at a clinic in San Pedro for children with physical disabilities. I met many amazing and courageous young males and females here. One of the children, Manuel, has no use of his arms or legs but has not given up hope; he paints beautiful pictures every day while holding the paintbrush in his mouth. I also met another artist, Milton, who had a stroke about two years ago and has very poor use of his right hand. He has taught himself how to draw with his left hand. This really showed me his natural, God-given ability for drawing.

Many of these children would have different outcomes if they were born in the United States. Being in Guatemala for two weeks showed me how lucky I am to be living in the U.S. The faith of the Guatemalans is as strong as ever, through the good and the bad. If you asked Manuel, he would say that he's blessed to still be able to paint using his mouth. Milton would say he's lucky he can still use his left hand. This trip has made me think about what my blessings are and how I am using them. I hope others may be as lucky as I was, to be able to take advantage of an opportunity that has proven to be a truly worthwhile experience.

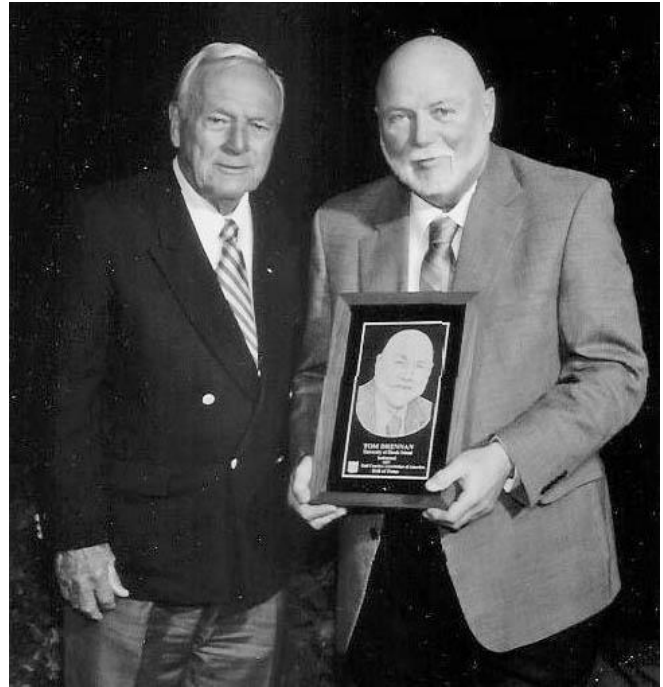

A Well-Earned Retirement

In 1961, **Tom Drennan** was a 22-year-old graduate of Providence College and had returned to his hometown of Wethersfield, CT. to teach history at his alma mater. He lettered in basketball, baseball and soccer in high school and was the manager of the Providence College basketball team that won the hearts of Rhode Island and also the NIT Championship in Madison Square Garden.

His coaching career began as football coach at Wethersfield, and continued as assistant basketball coach at Central High School in Providence with the late Jimmy Adams. In a few short years, he became golf coach, head basketball coach and Athletic Director of Roger Williams College in Bristol, R.I. Tom led the golf team to the 1968 NEIGA Small College Championship.

Soon opportunity knocked and he became assistant basketball coach with Jack Kraft at URI until 1977. He entered Administration as Assistant Director of Financial Aid and later was invited to become the men's golf coach at URI. Under Tom's direction Rhode Island has dominated men's college golf in the Northeast over the last

decade. The Rams have won 10 of the last 11 New England Intercollegiate Golf Association Championships, five Atlantic 10 Championships and made 16 straight NCAA regional appearances. Rhody has also won the New England Division 1 Championship 10 times in the past 11 years.

Eight years ago, Tom invited **Ralph Groves** to be his assistant coach and an existing friendship blossomed into a cross between "brothers" and "two grumpy old men!" They work together, travel together, play together and now retire together. It has been a wonderful experience for two exceptional men.

In addition to his already impressive resume, Tom was honored by the Golf Coaches Association of America as one of three inductees into its 2007 Hall of Fame Class along with Arnold Palmer! He has served as President of the National Golf Coaches Association of America. He has served as the NCAA District Chair for the National
